

WHY SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH RIGHTS [SRHR]?


- ☐ It's a human right

- ☐ Stabilise population growth and reduce poverty






YOUNG PEOPLE

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. Revise the current Family Life Education curriculum to comply with the UN, Revised 'International Technical Guidance on Sexuality Education' and guarantee its implementation throughout the national school system, including in Special Schools.
- 2. Increase budgetary allocation to ensure sufficient resources for the implementation of the Family Life Education curriculum and to provide ongoing professional development for teachers to ensure they are equipped to teach it
