

**Preliminary non-paper by the Secretariat**

**List of speakers**

(100609)

1. **Background:** The current situation regarding the list of speakers for the UPR process is subjected to criticisms by many observers. This is mostly due to the facts that since the speaking slots are limited to a certain number of speakers only (an average of 60 delegations in the Working Group and 10 in the plenary) those who want to participate in the discussion are lining up very early in order to have a chance to speak.
2. Some remedies were introduced by the Secretariat, such as the informal pre-registration of delegates outside the Conference Room to enable those queuing to get back to their normal duties pending the final registration. However, this has not diminish the pressure and shortcomings of the system with some delegations being present already at 4:00 a.m.- in order to secure a speaking slot.
3. Other measures were proposed by some countries (email or fax registration, drawing by lot etc.) but faced some criticisms for various technical or other difficulties based in particular in the absence of transparency which is considered as crucial in the circumstances.
4. After having considered the matter again, the Secretariat would like to propose the following option for the second UPR cycle and possibly before should there be a general support.
5. **Proposal:** The main idea would be to base the speakers-list on OP7 of GA Resolution 60/251, namely to build up a list having in mind the existing distribution of seats: **African Group : 13; Asian Group: 13; Eastern European Group: 6; GRULAC: 8 and Western European and Other States: 7.** This GA distribution would be used to allocated a number of speaking slots either in the plenary or the Working Group.
6. **Working Group:** A maximum of around 60 countries may speak during the WG debate. The distribution would therefore be as follows:

7. These ratios would be applied to each list of speakers and in order to round up the figures, the Regional Group which the State under Review belongs would be given an extra speaking slot. The resulting list of speakers would be as follows:

8. The resulting list would be drawn with the normal rotation order starting with the group which the SUR belongs to taking into account the above. Additional principles could be:
- Swaps between delegations would always be possible according to the usual practice of informing the Secretariat well in advance.
  - The Regional Coordinators would have the responsibility to provide the secretariat with the countries from their group desiring to speak and the proper order within their group.
  - Should a group not use all of its speaking slots, countries from other groups would then be in a position to speak using these slots taking into account the above ratio.

9. NB: It could be possible to envisage a random order in the allocation of the speaking slots.
10. **Plenary (ratio)** : Given the very limited number of speaking slots, the distribution is slightly more complicated. The figure 4 below provides the exact ratio rounded up to the closest 1/4<sup>th</sup>

11. The application of these ratios to the list of speakers **could** be as follows (with an overrepresentation of the group to which the SUR belong).

12. Since it is very difficult to divide in a fair manner a list containing 10 speaking slots, this list could be adjusted to the needs of all groups. It could be envisageable to add a speaker or two within the 20 minutes overall segment to make the division easier.

## Non-paper List of speakers UPR

(November 2009)

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1. Step 1: All lists of speakers would be opened at the same time one week before the opening of the UPR Working Group and will remain open for 2 days (Monday, Tuesday). All delegations will be in a position to inscribe on all the lists of their choice. The lists would be drawn up in the usual manner with numbers allotted determining the exact position on the list (from number 1 to whichever number corresponding to the last inscribed delegation).
2. Step 2: During a Bureau meeting on the following day (Wednesday morning), the President will draw for each list one number corresponding to the point of departure of each list of speakers. The lists of speakers will continue from that number downwards. When reaching the end of the list of speakers, and when time allows it, the list will subsequently continue from the top.
3. Step 3: Once the President, in the presence of the Bureau, has drawn the number where the list would begin, the secretariat will communicate to all UN Member States the full list of speakers for all States under Review, indicating the "point of departure" for each list (Wednesday afternoon).
4. As regards the consideration of the UPR report in the plenary, the details of a similar system will be shared at the appropriate time.

Option 3 : Possible combination of option 1 and 2

1. Steps 1 and 2 of option 2

2. Steps 3 will only be used for those lists of speakers for which the number of delegations who wish to intervene exceeds the ceiling of 60 interventions.

3. When going down from the list from the “point of departure” drawn by the President, the Secretariat, in the presence of and with the assistance of the Bureau, would identify the first 47 speakers on the list, bearing in mind the regional distribution of seats in the Human Rights Council. When a region reaches the maximum number of slots, the next country of that region will be put on a reserve list.

4. The remaining 13 delegations on the list of speakers (60-47) will be identified by further going down the list, starting by those who were put on the reserve list.
