Item 6 UPR outcome report of **Belarus** 23 September 2010

CIVICUS members and partners of the Belarusian civil society welcome with enthusiasm the participation of the Belarusian government in the Universal Periodic Review process. For the first time in many years, due to this mechanism, the situation of human rights in Belarus has not only become the subject of one-sided criticism from internal and external observers, but it has turned into the subject of a comprehensive dialogue with the Government on a wide range of problems. The interaction between the State and national human rights organizations, including those which are not officially registered during the preparatory process had no

However, we regret to note that the position of the Belarusian delegation during the interactive dialogue had mostly formal and non-constructive character. And we regret even more that what we now learned through the (last minute Addendum) Belarus has rejected most of the recommendations made by other governments and which reflect our most urgent requests. These are:

precedents in modern Belarus before and has created much hope for the future.

- Abolition or at least moratorium of the death penalty
- Guaranteeing Freedom of association
- Simplifying the registration procedure of associations, political parties and other forms of non-governmental organizations. de jure, and de facto:
- The ban on activities of unregistered non-governmental organizations should be abolished and criminal responsibility for such activities should be excluded from the Criminal Code of Belarus. Article 193-1 of the Criminal Code of Belarus is incompatible with the norms of freedom of association.
- We hope that the review of a **new Law on non-commercial organizations planned** for **next** year will improve the situation of civil society. We call on the Belarusian government to involve international experts into the development of this new Law.
- Implementing the decisions/recommendations of the UN Human Rights Committee and submitting overdue reports

However, civil society of Belarus believes that for our country, the points, set out in the report, will be the scale by which it will be possible to measure progress in the development of situation with human rights in the coming years. I thank
