## Item 6: Consideration of UPR reports

## **IRELAND**

Madam President.

Amnesty International welcomes the Irish government's engagement with civil society in preparing its National Report, and its commitment to continue this dialogue during its UPR follow-up.1

We welcome Ireland's support of recommendations to ratify outstanding human rights treaties,<sup>2</sup> in particular the International Convention for the Protection of All Persons from Enforced Disappearance.3 We note, however, that almost five years have elapsed since Ireland signed this important convention. We urge Ireland to ratify it without further delay.

Amnesty International is pleased that Ireland will sign the Optional Protocol to ICESCR.4 We also welcome Ireland's support of the recommendation to take measures required to respect economic, social and cultural rights.<sup>5</sup> However, we note that Ireland has only partially accepted the recommendation to incorporate into law the rights to health and housing.6 In light of recent severe funding cutbacks in areas such as healthcare, Ireland must now recognize these rights in law and thereby ensure the most vulnerable are protected. We urge that these rights be looked at in the upcoming review of Ireland's Constitution by a government appointed group, the Constitutional Convention.

## Madam President,

We note that UN treaty bodies have expressed concern at the prevalence of violence against women and girls in Ireland. We further note the high withdrawal rates of related complaints to police and low number of convictions in such cases.8 In this context, we particularly welcome Ireland's support of the recommendation to sign the Council of Europe Convention on Violence against Women and Domestic Violence.9 We urge the government to move to signature and ratification without delay.

Finally, Madam President, we encourage Ireland to set specific timeframes and to establish a monitoring mechanism for the implementation of the recommendations accepted in this review. We encourage the government to undertake to provide the Council with a midterm review and to continue to keep civil society and the Council regularly informed of its progress in implementing its commitments and accepted recommendations.
